

## **Dalhousie University – Probationary Tenure-Track position in Sociology of Mental Health and/or Disability**

The Department of Sociology and Social Anthropology invites applications for a probationary tenure track position at the rank of Assistant Professor in the **Sociology of Mental Health and/or Disability** commencing July 1, 2019. The successful candidate will teach SOSA 2503: Health and Society, a sociology of health course which is a requirement in Dalhousie's interdisciplinary Medical Sciences program. Applicants should be able to situate their work in Critical Health Studies, one of the department's three areas of specialization, and share responsibility for the department's core curriculum. Applicants must hold a PhD in Sociology or Sociocultural Anthropology, or be near completion. They should have a promising research profile and agenda, and demonstrated potential for teaching excellence. They will be expected to contribute to both undergraduate and graduate teaching and supervision (at B.A., M.A., and PhD levels). The position is subject to budgetary approval.

Established in 1818, Dalhousie is a leading research-intensive university offering more than 180 degree programs in 11 faculties. It is the largest university in Atlantic Canada and is located in the heart of Halifax, a scenic coastal city and capital of Nova Scotia, which is home to 13 Mi'kmaq First Nations, a deeply rooted African Canadian community, and an increasingly diverse population. The Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences is a dynamic body of students, faculty, and staff arranged in more than twenty programs and departments, many offering graduate degrees.
