

**1900408 – Assistant Professor, Teaching Stream in the area of Criminology or Law & Society**

The Department of Sociology at the University of Toronto Mississauga within the University of Toronto invites applications for one (1) full-time teaching stream appointment at the rank of Assistant Professor, Teaching Stream in the area of Criminology or Law & Society. The appointment will begin July 1, 2019, or shortly thereafter.

The successful candidate must have earned a Ph.D. in Sociology, Criminology, Law & Society or a closely related field by the date of the appointment or shortly thereafter. We seek candidates whose teaching interests complement and strengthen our [existing departmental strengths](#). The successful candidate must have demonstrated expertise in a degree granting program at the undergraduate level in pedagogical enquiry, curriculum development, teaching innovation as well as in the substantive area of Criminology and/or Law & Society. The successful candidate will be expected to develop and implement innovative teaching programs for our highly diverse student body.

The successful candidate must demonstrate evidence of excellence in teaching and a demonstrated commitment to pedagogical enquiry, curriculum development, and teaching innovation. Evidence of this excellence and commitment will be demonstrated by strong letters of reference from referees of high standing, awards and accolades, presentations at significant conferences, as well as a teaching dossier submitted as part of the application, including a statement of teaching philosophy, documentation of teaching accomplishments, sample syllabi and course materials, and teaching evaluations. The successful candidate must have a demonstrated interest in developing a long-term career in teaching and related scholarly activity in Criminology and/or Law & Society, in collaboration with the Sociology department's other faculty members and students. This includes developing experiential learning activities and other high impact practices, such as internships, service learning, internships, international field experiences, problem-based learning courses, and senior research projects. Finally, the candidate must demonstrate that they have a proven record of activities that contribute to equity and diversity with respect to indigeneity, gender, sexuality, (dis)ability, race, and ethnicity among others, addressing this in their letter of application.

Salary is commensurate with qualifications and experience.

The successful candidate will teach in the undergraduate program at the University of Toronto Mississauga, contributing primarily to our Criminology, Law & Society program. They will also be a member of the Graduate Department of Sociology, University of Toronto and have the opportunity to participate in the tri-campus graduate program housed at the St. George (downtown) campus.
