



King's University College at Western University, situated on the traditional territories of the Anishnaabek, Haudenosaunee, Lūnaapéewak, and Chonnonton peoples, invites applications for a **full-time, tenure-track appointment in the Department of Sociology** at the rank of Assistant Professor, effective July 1, 2023, subject to budgetary approval.

The successful candidates will contribute to the Department in one or more of the following areas:

- criminalization of racialized populations;
- critical race theory, Black Sociology, Black Feminisms, criminology and legal systems; Indigenous criminology;
- anti-racism movements, anti-colonial, anti-Islamophobia, Black liberation and/or Indigenous land defense and resurgence movements
- or other areas that demonstrate the intersection of racialization and criminalization.

We are particularly interested in the work of Black, Indigenous, and other racialized scholars whose research and teaching critically examine these substantive areas. In addition to teaching within the research areas noted above, the successful candidate will have the ability to teach at least one of the following courses: Introductory Sociology, Crime and Society, Research Methods, and/or Theory.

The Department of Sociology at King's University College offers undergraduate programs in Sociology and Criminology. With fourteen faculty, our programs build upon a strong core of sociological and criminological theory and research methods to offer a range of substantive topics and innovative learning opportunities. As faculty, we are committed to dismantling systemic forms of exclusion within our academic programming, within our institution and in the broader community, working towards inclusive and safe environments for all faculty, staff, and students under our EDID mission. The Department recognizes non-traditional forms of scholarship including, but not limited to, building long-term relationships with communities marginalized from access to resources, public power and decision-making, as well as engaging in activism or advocacy to support such communities.

To apply, please submit the following in a single PDF file: a letter of application; curriculum vitae; the names and contact information of three references; and a sample of scholarly work. Candidates are encouraged to highlight non-traditional forms of scholarship in their letter of application. Long-listed candidates will be asked for additional materials that may include a research statement and a teaching portfolio, including a course syllabus and evidence of teaching efficacy.
