PRESENTATION \rightarrow

Think more about the contribution you want to make; narrow your focus!

PAPFR

- → <u>Common issues</u>: poorly explained methodology, contribution to the literature, or research questions
- → Adhere to journal mission statements, style guidelines, length requirements, etc.

WHERE TO PUBLISH

- Talk to your supervisor
- Look to your literature review
- Canadian journals like the CRS have good reputations
- Publish in non-academic venues, especially if you are publicly funded
- Writing shorter articles in simpler language can help get your work to a larger audience

DISSERTATION \rightarrow BOOK

- 1. You need <u>patience</u> and a desire to translate your project into long-form writing
- 2. The goal is to weave a <u>single narrative</u> thread between research questions and findings
- 3. Try to speak to a broader audience, and exclude some of the more technical aspects you would include in a dissertation
- 4. General Submission Process: [1] Email editors at a University Press to gauge interest; [2] then submit a proposal; some require a manuscript, or a proposal plus a few chapters, etc. — it varies.
